
TECH EXECUTIVE REOPEN READY REPORT

A survey of 242 technology executives explores their reopening readiness and the new restrictions and rules they will implement as employees go back to the office during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Initial Response

The overwhelming majority, 86%, of survey respondents said their company left the office to work from home because of COVID-19.





Returning to the Office: CDC Rules the Rules

Of the survey respondents who said their companies were now operating fully or partially from home, 81% said they were involved in planning for the return to the office. Eighty-two percent of those respondents said they had started planning for their organization's return to the office. But what experts are they tapping for guidance? The top responses included:










What's in Your Returning Game Plan?

As they planned for employees' return, respondents reported how likely they were to include these requirements in their reopening plan. Fifty-nine percent of respondents with a reopening plan said they would or would likely require temperature screenings among returning employees. Thirty-one percent said they would or would likely require some sort of COVID-19 testing.



Change Up Your Work Space


Sixty-three percent of respondents with a reopening plan said that it will or will likely require a reconfiguration of their physical workspace. Additional office space changes will include:



Smaller Meetings will be the New Norm


Over three-quarters of respondents with a reopening plan said that it will or will likely limit the number of face-to-face meeting participants.

Additional meeting changes include:




Hand Sanitizer and Safety Signs Proliferate

Nearly all respondents, 98%, with a reopening plan said they planned or likely planned to provide disinfecting supplies and PPE as appropriate. And 81% said they would or would likely communicate new building protocols through signage and floor markings.




WFH for the Long Haul

Of those whose companies switched to a WFH model, 56% of respondents expected employees to begin returning to work between June and September, but some plan to stick it out for longer or never return:




Three-Day Workweek, Anyone?

A plurality of respondents, 47%, said they would feel comfortable coming into the office for a limited number of days each week.




The Return Discomfort is Real

Of respondents with a reopening plan, 60% said they had surveyed their workforce on returning to the office. The majority of this group said their employees were uncomfortable with the idea.




Some Meetings are Acceptable

Eighty-three percent of respondents said they would feel comfortable coming to the office for specific meetings.



Top Concerns Include Infection and Using Common Spaces

When asked how concerned they were about different aspects of returning to the office, many pointed their finger at elevators, childcare and the risk of infection.



About the Tech Executive Reopen Ready Report

This is a survey of 242 technology executives in Georgia regarding their organizations' return to the workplace following COVID-19 closures. Of the respondents, 77% are C-suite members. Of the responding organizations, nearly 3-out-of-4 (73%) lease office space in a multitenant building. A third (33%) lease 5,000 sq. ft. or less, 41% lease between 5,001 and 20,000 sq. ft., and 25% lease more than 20,000 sq. ft. On the employment front, 54% have fewer than 50 employees, 32% have between 50 and 999 employees, and 14% have more than 1,000 employees. The survey was conducted between May and June of 2020, polling members of FinTech Atlanta, Technology Association of Georgia and Technology Executive Roundtable.







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
